The Labour Party History

The 1880's saw an upsurge in socialism, with both the Fabian Society (formed to establish a democratic socialist state in the UK, via means of evolutionary socialism, rather than revolution) and Social Democratic Federation being founded in 1884. In the same year, the Reform Act extended the franchise to more working-class men.

In 1893 (James) Keir Hardie helped found the Independent Labour Party. At the age of 10, he had worked in the Lanarkshire mines. He was a Scottish trade unionist. He served as the party's first parliamentary leader from 1906-1908, when Labour also had 26 MPs.

Hardie believed the working classes needed parliamentary representation, independent of the existing political parties.

The trade unions had been content to put up their own candidates within the Liberal Party. Increasing hostility towards the unions saw them more open to the idea of an alliance with the socialists.

The TUC voted to hold a special conference which in February 1900 established the Labour Representation Committee. After the 1906 General Election the LRC was formally renamed the Labour Party.

Labour was first elected to form a government in 1924 under the premiership of Ramsay MacDonald. In spite of having no majority, this government passed legislation to improve housing, education and social insurance. Nevertheless, this government only lasted a few months. The second Labour government was elected 5 years later following the economic crash and focused on tackling unemployment. In the 1931 election, only 52 MPs were elected.

Clement Attlee became Deputy Leader in 1931 and worked with Ernest Bevin and Hugh Dalton to prepare for the next Labour Government which was elected in the first post World War 2 election. Labour won with a landslide 393 seats. This government tackled key issues in a failing economy, introducing social security, nationalisation of key industries and a major

house building programme. Its greatest achievement was the founding of the NHS, spearheaded by Nye Bevan.

Labour lost the next election in 1951 and would not return to power until 1964, with Harold Wilson at the helm. Under his government (1964-70) and the James Callaghan led government (1974-79) Labour ended the death penalty, decriminalised homosexuality, legislated to outlaw racial discrimination and established the Open University.

The ground-breaking Equal Pay Act was introduced, by Secretary of State for Employment, Barbara Castle, following a strike by Women machinists at the Ford Factory in Dagenham.

Following defeat in 1979, the leadership passed to Michael Foot, followed by Neil Kinnock and then John Smith. All tried to reconstruct and modernise the party.

Tony Blair took over as leader in 1994 and became Prime Minister following the landslide election victory in 1997. Achievements in both the Blair and Brown governments included record investment in the NHS, education, and the police as well as the introduction of the National Minimum Wage and devolution for Scotland, Wales, and N. Ireland. The Good Friday Agreement brought peace to N. Ireland. Civil Partnerships and the Equality and Human Rights Acts were established and much of the world's poorest countries saw their debt cancelled.

Labour lost the 2000 General Election, to a backdrop of the world financial crisis. Ed Milliband became leader and campaigned to protect our public services and further democratise the party.

The defeat in the 2015 election saw him replaced, by Jeremy Corbyn. The party tripled in size and work was undertaken on a transformative new set of policies. In the 2017 election, Labour saw its biggest increase, in the share of the vote, since 1945, with 262 MPs, 45% of whom were women.

Following the 2019 election defeat, Keir Starmer was elected leader.

The Labour Party Structure

The PLP (Parliamentary Labour Party):

The term parliamentary Labour Party refers to the party in Parliament, whereas the term Labour Party refers to the entire Labour Party, the parliamentary element of which is the PLP.

Originally, the Leader of the Labour Party was elected by the PLP. Now, however, the party operates on a one member, one vote system, where all members are awarded a single vote, as well as affiliated organisations (trade unions and socialist societies) and temporary registered supporters.

Regional Structures

Scotland and Wales have their own Executives. England is divided into Regional Boards. All have a role in policy development and organise local conferences. Huntingdon CLP's Regional Organisation is Eastern Region. You may receive communications from them from time to time.

CLP (Constituency Labour Party)

CLPs are based on the electoral district for the MP. CLPs can choose members to represent them at National Conference and can vote on their candidate for MP. CLPs organise local council and electoral campaigns, as well as key campaigns to publicise and raise awareness of national and local issues.

CLPs elect officers and establish an Executive Committee to oversee the day to day running of the CLP. CLPs also organise hustings for parliamentary candidates in the lead up to General Elections.

Huntingdon CLP operates under an All-Member structure. This means that all members are invited to attend CLP monthly meetings and to vote on any motions tabled. Delegate structures are in place at some CLPS, whereby

delegates are chosen from each branch to represent and vote on behalf of their branches.

BLP (Branch Labour Party)

Huntingdon CLP has 3 branches:

- Huntingdon & Godmanchester
- St Neots
- St Ives.

The branches organise campaign activity for their own branch, raise awareness, among the local community, of local issues, via websites and social media. They organise local meetings, which will be communicated, via the branch Secretary, on social media and local websites.

The structures within the Labour Party are determined by the party rule book.

Huntingdonshire District Council has 52 councillors, also known as members, who represent 29 wards across the district.

The council has decided that, from 3 May 2018, district council elections will be held every four years. Councillors currently are elected by thirds, which means there is a district council election in three out of four years

What is a councillor?

Councillors are elected by local people to plan, run, monitor, and develop council business. They work to improve the quality of life of people within the district and make decisions about local issues.

Councillors are the voice of their community and have the opportunity to make a significant difference to the lives of residents. They are involved in decision-making through Full Council meetings, regulatory committees, and panels and as members on partnership boards. They also influence and determine the development and review of policies and strategies and play a part in the **overview and scrutiny** function.

Councillors also act as community leaders and work in partnership with other organisations, including the voluntary and community sector, to improve services and quality of life for residents.

Fundraising
